With the entry into force of the UN Port State Measures Agreement (PSMA) in 2016, the opening session of the forum will assess the strengths and obligations of the agreement and discuss the challenges faced in uptake, financing and implementation. There will be a discussion on the ‘next steps’ required to build on the momentum of the PSMA as the agreement moves from political ratification to implementation.

- What concrete actions can now be taken by states that have ratified the PSMA?
- How to prevent ‘port-hopping’ to markets not signed up to the PSMA and encourage states with globally significant fishing ports and markets to ratify?
- How can the capacity and skills needed for implementation and enforcement, particularly in developing countries, be increased?
- What is the progress on funding mechanisms for building capacity to implement PSMA measures?

How can the gap between international conventions and practical implementation and enforcement on the high seas be bridged? A discussion on the implications of IUU fishing on the Arctic sea will follow the formal presentations, raising important questions around fisheries management and high seas governance predominantly through the lens of the Central Arctic Ocean, which may be navigable as early as the first half of this century.

Directions from within London

By Underground

The nearest London Underground Stations are *Piccadilly Circus* (three minutes' walk) and *Green Park* (five minutes' walk). Use the [Transport for London website](#) and [Google Maps](#) to plan your journey.

By Bus

By Train

Charing Cross station is a 10 minute walk from Chatham House. *Waterloo* is 15 minutes by London Underground.

Directions from London Airports and St Pancras International

From Heathrow Airport

Option One: London Underground. Follow signs in the arrival hall to the underground. Take the *Piccadilly* line and alight at *Piccadilly Circus*.

Option Two: Heathrow Express Train. Departs every five minutes, arrives *Paddington Station*.

Continuing your journey by underground to Chatham House

Take the *Bakerloo* line from *Paddington Station* and alight at *Piccadilly Circus*. Exit Piccadilly (South Side) and continue along Piccadilly, after 40m turn left on to Church Place. Continue to the end of Church Street, turn right on to Jermyn Street and soon after turn left on to Duke of York Street. Turn right on to St James's Square. Chatham House is the first door on the right.

From Gatwick Airport

Take the Gatwick Express train. Departs every 15 minutes, arrives *Victoria* station.

Continuing your journey by London Underground to Chatham House

From *Victoria* station, take the *Victoria* line to *Green Park*. Exit: *Green Park* (Piccadilly Exit Southside), walk along Piccadilly, turn right on to St James's Street. Turn left onto Jermyn Street and continue for 200m, then turn right onto Duke of York Street. Turn right on to St James's Square. Chatham House is the first door on the right.

From Stansted Airport

Take the Stansted Express train. Departs every 15 minutes, arrives *Liverpool Street* station.

Continuing your journey by London Underground to Chatham House

Take the *Central* line to *Holborn* and change to the *Piccadilly* line and alight at *Piccadilly Circus*. Exit: Piccadilly (South Side); continue along Piccadilly and after 40m turn left on to Church Place. Continue to the end of Church Street, turn right on to Jermyn Street and soon after turn left on to Duke of York Street. Finally, turn right on to St James's Square. Chatham House is the first door on the right.

From Luton Airport

Take the shuttle bus from outside the terminal building to *Luton Airport Parkway* train station for the Thameslink train to *King's Cross* station.

Continuing your journey by Underground to Chatham House

Alight from Thameslink at *King's Cross* and take the *Piccadilly* line to *Piccadilly Circus*. Exit: Piccadilly (South side); continue along Piccadilly and after 40m turn left on to Church Place. Continue to the end of Church Street, turn right on to Jermyn Street and soon after turn left on to Duke of York Street. Finally, turn right on to St James's Square. Chatham House is the first door on the right.

From London City Airport

Take the Docklands Light Railway (DLR) to *Canning Town* Station. From *Canning Town*, take the *Jubilee* line to *Green Park* station. Exit: Green Park (Piccadilly Exit Southside), walk along Piccadilly, turn right on to St James's Street. Turn left onto Jermyn Street and continue for 200m, then turn right onto Duke of York Street. Turn right on to St James's Square. Chatham House is the first door on the right.


Chatham House Rule
